# 2025 University of New Mexico McNair Scholars Conference

SRI25 scholars attended the 2025 University of New Mexico McNair Scholars Conference in Albuquerque where they presented their research alongside peers from across the nation. Scholars presented their work via a 12-minute oral presentation format and were allotted three minutes to answer questions. Evaluators also attended their presentations and provided scholars with valuable feedback that provided a rigorous learning process. Scholars also benefited from excellent networking opportunities, attended a graduate school fair, and took free professional headshot photos.

















Scholars embraced and experienced the diverse traditions of New Mexico with cultural activities by touring Old Town Albuquerque, indulging in New Mexican cuisine, ascending 10,378 feet through the Sandia Mountains in an aerial tramway, and experiencing a flamenco dance performance.





# Undergraduate Research Symposium

The Fall 2025 Undergraduate Research Symposium showcased 37 research projects from Our Lady of the Lake University (OLLU) across a wide range of academic disciplines.

The Ronald E. McNair Scholars program, in collaboration with dedicated faculty and staff, prepare and guide undergraduate students as they develop their research findings. Through mentoring, structured workshops, and hands-on support, students learn how to refine their research question, gather and analyze data, and translate their work into a clear and compelling poster presentation for the symposium. This platform allows students to share their presentation and communication skills, provides opportunities for students to receive

constructive feedback, engage in meaningful dialogue, and collaborate with the academic community. The symposium also strengthens critical thinking. problem-solving, analytical skills. and as students learn to ask questions, evaluate evidence. and present their findings effectively. Such experiences not only deepen students' understanding of their academic disciplines but also build confidence and resilience. This semester. The Undergraduate Research Symposium was held at MAIN 311 and included two rounds



of presentations, a resource fair, and concluded with poster awards and pictures. Senior Bethany Garr was presented with the STEM Award for her poster presentation titled, Understanding the Effects of Varying Light Intensity on Coral Bleaching Using the Cnidarian Model System Aiptasia. Junior Annabelle Prindle was presented with the HABS Award for her poster presentation titled, Saint-Therese and Public Religiosity. Seniors Jasmine Hernandez, Yami Zamarripa, and Jose Saucedo were recognized for the People's Choice Award for their poster presentation titled, The effects of Music Tempo on Walking Cadence on Reaction Time, Agility, and Cognitive Speed.

They also met with a member of the Conservation Research team, who shared insights on planning and best-practice efforts for the new addition of Congo Falls; an immersive habitat that will be the new home for seven gorillas. The Education Coordinator of School and Community Engagement spoke to the various internships and research opportunities that are available to scholars. # CONGRATULATIONS Dr. Ana Victoria Quintero Recent graduate of the Baylor University



Dr. Ana Victoria Quintero (C/O 18)

Dr. Ana Victoria Ouintero C/O '18, earned her PhD in Chemistry with a specialization in Analytical Chemistry from Baylor University in August 2025. Her doctoral dissertation, "Advancing the Characterization of Glycan In-Electrospray **Dynamics** with Ionization Hydrogen/Deuterium Exchange-Mass Spectrometry", developing and applying spectrometry-based methods for the analysis carbohydrates, a class of molecules with essential roles in biological function. Using in-electrospray ionization hydrogen/deuterium exchange-mass spectrometry (in-ESI HDX-MS), she rapidly labeled and structurally characterized carbohydrate isomers. Since many

carbohydrate isomers share identical chemical compositions, distinguishing them remains a major analytical challenge. Her work aimed to develop new methodologies to study carbohydrate dynamics, which are crucial for understanding structure-function relationships. Dr. Quintero is currently a postdoctoral research fellow at UT Health San Antonio, where she focuses on spatial metabolomics to advance kidney disease research. Her work utilizes matrix-assisted laser desorption/ionization mass spectrometry imaging (MALDI-MSI) and liquid chromatography/mass spectrometry (LC-MS) to analyze the metabolic composition of kidney tissue. By mapping the spatial distribution of metabolites directly on tissue sections, she aims to identify molecular biomarkers associated with kidney disease progression. Her research aims to improve early detection and treatment strategies for kidney disease.

Kaitlyn Salazar earned her Bachelor of Science in Kinesiology from Our Lady of the Lake University (OLLU) in 2021, where she was a dedicated student-athlete on the college softball team and a recognized McNair Scholar. She further advanced her education by completing her Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) from the University of the Incarnate Word (UIW) in 2025. During her doctoral studies, Kaitlyn demonstrated a commitment to evidence-based practice and clinical education. She actively participated in research teams

and led in service meetings for her peers and faculty on

crucial physical therapy topics. These educational sessions focused on integrating the latest evidence into practice, including: Pain Neuroscience Education (PNE): Presenting on effective strategies for managing chronic pain by utilizing PNE to help patients understand the biological and psychological factors contributing to persistent pain, ultimately empowering them to change their relationship with pain. Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPGs) for Congenital Muscular Torticollis: Reviewing and presenting the current CPGs to ensure optimal assessment and intervention techniques for infants and children with torticollis, highlighting the importance of early diagnosis and standardized care. These contributions underscore Kaitlyn's dedication not only to mastering complex concepts but also to translating research into actionable clinical knowledge. Kaitlyn now serves the San Antonio community, practicing part-time at an outpatient orthopedic clinic under a temporary license. She is currently preparing for her board certification examination at the end of January. In her clinical role, she is gaining valuable experience treating a diverse range of populations and specialties in orthopedic physical therapy, applying her knowledge in pain science and standardized care to improve patient outcomes.



# Texas Tech University Health Science Center Psychology Fellow

Kevin Rodriguez, Ph.D., C/O '16 recently started a new position as a Psychology Fellow with the Department of Psychiatry at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso. As a Psychology Fellow, Dr. Rodriguez provides bilingual psychotherapy, crisis intervention, assessment, and consultation across several clinics, including adult outpatient clinic and school-based telehealth services for children and adolescents through statewide mental health initiatives. His role centers on increasing access to mental health care for underserved communities in the borderland region and supporting families navigating complex cultural and socioeconomic stressors. In addition to serving the community, Dr. Rodriguez is involved in ongoing research with the Psychiatry Department Southwest Brain Bank at Texas Tech University Heath Sciences Center El Paso, where he collaborates on studies examining suicide risk factors as BMI, brain weight, and method-specific

differences among decedents. When asked how the McNair Program has helped him in his professional career, Dr. Rodriguez shared, "My research is grounded in the strong research foundation I developed through McNair, which prepared me for the advanced work I completed during my Ph.D. at Palo Alto University and my current collaborations at Texas Tech." During his time at Our Lady of the Lake University and as a McNair Scholar, Dr. Rodriguez was mentored by Kathryn B. Anderson, Ph.D., Professor of Psychology. "The

skills I developed in designing an IRB-approved study, collecting and analyzing data, writing for publication, and presenting at conferences directly supported my dissertation and continue to inform my work as a clinician and researcher," shared Dr. Rodriguez. "McNair also provided the community and confidence I needed as a first-generation scholar, helping me see myself as someone who belonged in academic and clinical spaces. Its values continue to guide my work: cultural humility, social justice, and community-centered care."
